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



3. WOLF CHILD

In last November, Portugal has its own wolf child. In the hills near Serpa, in the northeast of the Alentejo, a woman was discovered by accident who has lived a parent-imposed solitary life there for 23 years. Until the age of 10, Ana de Fátima went to school like any normal child, but subsequently her parents, who thought she had some sort of aberration, kept her separate from the outside world.

Wolf children (as a rule, the term wild or isolated children is more appropriate) have always spoke to the imagination. The (fictitious) Romulus and Remus, Mowgli and Tarzan manage to cope well and are socialized miraculously, but the real cases

(approximately 100 cases are known) are endlessly more distressing and moving. A source of inspiration for scientists, authors and filmmakers that much is true. Truffaut made a film about Victor, the 'Wild Boy' of Aveyron; Werner Herzog made a film about Kaspar Hauser; Davenport about Californian girl Genie, who was kept locked up for 11 years, mostly tied to a chair. Recently, 3096 Tage was released, the



film about Natascha Kampusch, the Austrian girl who was kidnapped at the age of 10 and was locked in a cellar for eight years.

For the time being, Ana de Fátima who 'stopped in time at the age of 9', as the social workers put it, is beings taken care of in an old people's home. There are high hopes that in time, she'll be able to live independently.
