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# 1. ROUTE MONTE DO CASARÃO

who for many years had been scoring triumphs in famous concert halls abroad, was awarded a number of national prizes. Since then, fado 'is allowed' once more

and counts as an acknowledged singing technique associated with big names.

And to answer a question asked by one of our guests: the Coimbra fado differs from the Lisbon fado in that the former is sung exclusively by men and contains more vibrations and trills.

There are calves, some lanky adolescents, mothers and aunties and one actual bull.
