It's a beautiful trail along the Atlantic Ocean, which slowly but surely is being discovered by foreign travel journalists. Our guests regularly send us articles about the *Trilho dos Pescadores* they came across in their newspapers.

3. SMALL PRINT

The majority of our guests does not find us through a travel agency, but organizes the holiday and everything connected to it by themselves, including renting a car. Nowadays, that's not too complicated and there is plenty of choice. There are a wide variety of car rentals, the one even cheaper than the other, and if you continue searching, you may find a really good deal, emphasizing MAY. In order not to feel disgruntled when you get into your rental and start your holiday, it is important to read the small print carefully. You may think you struck a bargain, but obviously the rental companies aren't charitable organisations. They have to make ends meet. The policy excess is such a point of interest; then there's the choice regarding comprehensive insurance, theft insurance, the number of free kilometres included in the rental, the number of drivers, the option of crossing the Spanish border, the diver's age: all subjects that can result in widely divergent rates.

The fuel policies differ too. Some companies let you leave with a full tank (for which you pay more than you would if you filled it up yourself) after which you have to hand it in empty. The latest:



You drive off with a full tank and you hand it in again with a quarter-full tank. So, well, it just so you know in advance.

4. **A22 or N125**

And then there's the toll. Since 2012, a toll is taken on the A22, the highway between Faro and

Albufeira. You cannot buy a ticket. The car's number plate is scanned. If there's a box in the rental car, the amount due is automatically debited to the rental company's account.



For that box you pay a deposit, on average €1,50 per day. When you hand in the car, you pay the outstanding toll. As a rule, you'll only drive the A22 on the way up and back, which amounts to less than €5.

You can choose not to pay a deposit. In that case, you will need to take the N125, the parallel road. It takes 15 minutes longer, but is really variegated. There are lots of villages, little cafés and potteries. It is busier, especially during rush hour, and there are quite a few traffic lights. Also, delicious oranges from December to May.

If there's no box in the car (you'd best check), you can still opt for the A22 on the way up. In that case, you need to pay in the toll at the post office within ten days. We can pay the toll for the way back for you, or you can take the N125 after all.
