TERROR SPARROWS

Even if house sparrows are on the RSPB's Red List, we have plenty of them here. Obviously, house sparrows are really social creatures. They found us some five years ago, and now

they simply won't go away.

'Isn't that cosy?' you may think. Certainly, we thought so too. Until the sparrows started bullying and harassing the swallows that used to come here every year. They vandalised their nests and chased them out of the garage. Be it the barn swallow or the red-rumped swallow: the sparrow simply didn't want them anywhere near. Sheer spite, for they make their own nests in a box containing rags or books, or on the surfboard.

Or in the chimney, as it happens. For a while, we had smelled gas in the kitchen while the geyser was on. As it turned out, the entire drainpipe, a meter-and-a-half long, was full of straws. That means the sparrows have been dropping straws and rubbish into the pipe until it was high enough to make a nest.

CORK

On Monte do Casarão, we have quite a few cork oaks. Once every ten years the oaks are peeled. The cork is sold. Guests are often sur-prised: 'Cork? That's worthless, isn't it? What's the use? Nowadays wine bottles have screw caps!



Nothing is further from the truth. Generating a value of 1,1 billion euros in 2021 (a record year), Portugal is still the world leader where the production and export of cork is concerned. The wine industry – topped by France and the US – is the primary destination by far, accounting for 78%. the rest of the cork finds its way in construction and the design industry. Consider how cork is used as insulation and covering material. Also, cork is used in the fishing and car industries. For instance, in the new Mazda MX-30 (Mazda started out as a cork producer) the interior consist for a large part of cork. And there is more. It may be an idea for when you are here: a visit to one of the shops that exclusively sell cork products. Nice for the folks back home.

THE MUSHROOM MAN

And then he was here. Edwin Flores, the mushroom man. The first contacts dated from December 2019, but due to the perils of corona, appointments had to be postponed time and again. I wanted to know more about fungi, particularly about mushrooms, and after a bit of googling, I found Edwin. He offered to visit us and teach me the tricks of foraging for mushrooms. We went out for an entire week. The harvest was meagre, as it was far too dry and



mushrooms, but Edwin found them anyway. At night, he used the boletuses, portobellos, oyster and parasol mushrooms and the areenorange milkcaps in special dishes. Edwin was our private chef
